

Here you can find the latest news direct from our region's young people.



Relay for Life





Cancer Council Queensland's Relay for Life has become an entrenched event in BCC culture - with teams involved in this Walkathon style fundraising event annually since 2011.

The inaugural team committed to relay when a special member of our college community, Mrs Stephanie Jarvis succumbed to cancer - we relayed with her sons, Chris and Johnno.



The original team was called BCC Rising Hope and we have always used that name, the motivation being Isaiah 40:31 - But those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint. Hope is a key theme of Relay for Life and for so many people "cancer" is a faith journey; encouraging, empathising and showing community support can make such a difference.



At each relay we celebrate survival, remember loss and consider ways to fight back. It is a challenging time of reflection and commitment, and BCC students are committee, each taking part in communal fundraising as well as individually fund raising a substantial amount. We have a core group of BCC staff who have over the years committed their time to relay: Mr Gees, Mrs Ramsay, Mrs McKim, Mrs Newton, Mrs Petersen, Miss Petersen and Mrs Darby. Some students have also been committed throughout their secondary schooling and relay is an essential part of serving their community.



This year a group of 27 students and 14 staff members took part in Relay for Life and raised \$7600 - our highest fund-raising amount yet. What a team!!! (the team also received an award for "Best School Spirit" and "Highest School Fundraiser". In fact they were the third highest fundraisers OVERALL © Way to go team! - Ed.)

Sweet 25-Year Celebration

It was donuts for all as BCC held its 25-year anniversary celebrations with a formal assembly, time capsule opening and students forming a 25 on the oval. Donut King created 700 donuts, sponsored by Parups Waring Architecture. The opening of the capsule revealed memoirs and historical documents such as the first year book produced in 1997, 2006 class rolls, letters by students and staff, drawings, cards, photographs and paintings. This speaks volumes about the influence and pride of both staff and students feel about being a part of the Bcc community.





Sunshine and laughter filled the air at this year's BCC Festival & Preptastic with the community strolling in as soon as the gates opened and had over 4000 people attending the day, packed with entertainment, live music, market stalls, stalls ran by students and staff, food galore, pony rides, a petting zoo and much more.

This year's festival was significant because it coincided with the College's 25 Year Anniversary and this event was a celebration of the achievements all students and alumni, the dedicated staff, families and wider community who have supported the College.

Wonder of Science Champions

Our Years 7, 8 and 9 Science students participated in the University of Queensland's *Wonder of Science* program this term. Students have been working on experimental investigation projects in small teams, culminating in a presentation of their findings. Two teams of four students from each year level were nominated for the Regional Conference in Gladstone. Armed with their presentations, laptops and props, students took on teams from other

schools in the region. In the end, Bundaberg High teams were awarded 1st and 2nd place in each of the year level showcase competitions. Our Regional Champion teams have been invited to compete in the State Conference in November.



PNG/AUS Partnerships ~ Climate Resilience Design Sprint

Students from Years 7, 8 and 10 participated in a full-day online *Climate Resilience Design Sprint* as part of the PNG/AUS Partnership. Developed in collaboration with Australia-Pacific Climate Partnership, the *Climate Resilience Design Sprint* aimed to deepen students' understanding of climate resilience and the role of design thinking in preparing a community to be more resilient in the face of climate change. Students explored the problem of storms becoming more intense in part due to climate change, and worked collaboratively to design a prototype solution. The students developed the *PEAK – Preparation Emergency Assistance Kit* app. Inspired by the Bundaberg Floods of 2011 and 2013, students collaboratively designed this app to notify people of incoming storms and potential flooding, and to give them a preparation checklist, evacuation routes linked to Google Maps, timelines, emergency help notifications, and an 'I'm safe' check-in functionality.

Giving Back to the Community

Junior and Senior students joined forces in identifying, planning, and implementing activities to raise funds in giving back to organisations that have an impact in our community.

Cancer has touched many of our lives in some way or another. This year Abby I., Kaylah P., Kimmy T. and Soraya L. participated in the *Ponytail Project*. Students chopped off their ponytail in an effort to bring awareness and raise funds for Cancer Council.



Relay for Life

Relay for Life is a fun and moving experience that raises vital funds for Cancer Council research, prevention, information and support services. Students and staff raised monies through raffles to give back to our Bundaberg community. Relay for Life is an opportunity to recognise and celebrate local cancer survivors and their carers, and to honour and remember loved ones lost to cancer.



R U OK? Day

Senior leaders took *R U OK? Day* under their wing with the handing out of *R U OK?* bookmarks, the selling of cupcakes and putting posters up around the school. *R U OK? Day* is an annual suicide prevention event. All proceeds from the selling of the cupcakes (\$200) was donated to the *R U OK?* organisation



Body Kind Schools

Students and staff participated in a *Wacky Wednesday Free Dress* raising \$1 078.00 to be donated to Body Kind Schools – Butterfly Foundation. Butterfly Foundation changes lives by providing innovative support services, treatment and resources, and delivering prevention and early intervention programs.

Dead Pen Collection

We are extremely proud of this Isis District SHS and student her horsemanship skills, well done Aliana!










Year 11 Students Tackle Leadership!



First Nations Student Support Centre

A home away from home for our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities

Kepnock SHS is home to people from all walks of life. We house a diverse group of people in our community yet a champion to many is the one and only Mr Craig Currie. Beloved by many for the incredible work he does with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, Mr Currie hosts multitude of activities from his First Nations Student Support Centre.



As a Community Education Counsellor, he guides Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students through a number of activities which are based around traditional First Nations cultures creating a more diverse atmosphere at the school. Having success on multiple levels providing these inclusive initiatives it was no surprise to hear he led a group of young inspired students to place 1st in the ATSIAP 2021 Persuasive Competition.

Standing for 'Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Aspirations Program', ATSIAP is a university run competition that provides opportunities for high achieving students to extend themselves in STEM based challenges. Mr Currie explained, "I was excited to provides these opportunities to the brilliant Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students we have in our school."

With a group consisting of two Year 9 students in Zane and Amarlie and Year 7 student Levi they successfully competed with other students around the state. The team had to first make it through a regional competition before taking on the state as a whole.

They cleverly collaborated together to complete four challenges in art, poetry, persuasive speaking and a commercial. These tasks all revolved around solving environmental issues currently occurring in our local waterways. This innovative group of students looked to address these environmental issues as Zane explains, "It was riveting to be able to work as a team while seamlessly utilising cultural knowledge to fix a modern problem."

The ATSIAP team did an incredible job over the course of the competition and will only improve under the continued guidance of Mr Currie. The team agreed that they may have reached the pinnacle in one part of the competition this year but they are looking forward to taking it out as a whole next year!



Promote, Protect and Preserve

This years Ingenium Bursary is all about The Great Barrier Reef. This time however, the students aren't solo. The rules are as follows, each team must come up with an idea to promote, protect and preserve the reef. Students will learn how to interpret the 6Cs: character, citizenship, creativity, communication, collaboration and critical thinking.

So how does Ingenium benefit student's futures? The goal is to create opportunities to collaborate as a team through challenging tasks that pose real life problems. Doing this will allow students to foster communication, creativity and critical thinking skills will they propose solutions to impact on societal change. The teacher leading this innovative program, Mrs Amey explains, "Since the students are exposed to established entrepreneurs, it allows them to engage actively to develop expert consultation and create career pathway driven opportunities."

As young entrepreneur Amelie euthanised, "This program has helped me develop entrepreneurial skills. Since I've always had a passion for marine life, this year's task was captivating."
