Here you can find the latest news direct from our region's young people.



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Isis High Cattle Team On Show

In the early weeks of Term 2, the cattle yards at Isis High were in full swing as a team of nearly 20 students began breaking in and preparing cattle for the upcoming show season. The students in the team showed their commitment by attending two lunch times and one afternoon a week in order to prepare both themselves and the cattle for competitions in Childers and Bundaberg.

This year Isis High is fortunate to have five (5) head of cattle for use by both the Cattle team and classes learning about livestock. We have three Brahamasin steers - named Loki, Thor and Zeus; one Speckle Park Steer named Blackie and one Speckle Park heifer known as Sunshine. The Brahamasin steers were purchased from Peter Illet and the Speckle Park cattle were kindly donated for use by the Warren Family. The students compete at the shows in Junior Handlers and Junior Judging.

Junior handlers is a competition where the students parade the cattle around the ring under the watchful eye of the judge and are placed on their ability to lead, present and stand their animal. The Isis team showed their talent with several students making finals and gaining ribbons across the two shows.

Junior Judging helps students to develop an understanding of cattle on a structural level, obtain a greater understanding of the cattle industry along with improving their public speaking skills. Students are asked to place a line-up of cattle in an order of first to

fourth based on their ability to either breed or obtain a high market value as meat, then explain why they have placed them that way. In Childers, the students were asked to judge a pen of steers and in Bundaberg, the students were asked to judge bulls. Once again students from

Isis High competed well with several achieving placings. The team came home with a total of nine (9) ribbons from the two shows and several prizes for placings.

The students wore the Isis uniform proudly and will now take what they have learned from the two shows to continue to train and improve their skills ready for Hook and Hoof competition later in the year.

We would like to thank Peter Illet for transporting the cattle to Bundaberg, the Warren Family for their support, feed donations and the use of their cattle for these shows and Riverina Stock Feeds for their generous support of our cattle team.

Read to Me Day is on again this year.

For the past two years, the Childers community has come together to inspire under 8s to enjoy reading, to find the fun and sheer pleasure in escaping within the written words or pictures on the page. Isis High students form a fundamental part of this impressive community event.

In the lead up to the event, students within Business classes develop posters to be displayed around town and at local schools whilst those in Performing Arts subjects undertake courses in clowning, yes 'clowning about' in order to perform on the day. Their performances encourage the young children to see words come to life, spark their imagination and make reading fun. Art students complete the book bags distributed on the day whilst the Media students capture the day with both still and video images.



The Burnett Youth Learning Centre is a Special Assistance School (SAS). The word "special" has different meanings in different contexts but one definition in the dictionary for "special" is simply, *that which is otherwise different from what is usual*. And that is exactly what I consider our SAS school to be, a different approach to schooling.

Given time and support, we at Burnett Youth Learning Centre believe that everyone can find their purpose. That is why we are committed to creating a healthy school community where young people are not underestimated for their potential to achieve, and teachers and support staff are supported to work towards and celebrate a shared vision for educational outcomes for students. That isn't necessarily different from what is usual, but our approach sure is – that's what makes us a *Special* Assistance School.



The Burnett Youth Learning Centre provides a supportive and nurturing environment, contributing to the development of students' sense of selfworth, enthusiasm for learning and optimism for the future. BYLC activities are committed to the re-engagement of disengaged youth. The Centre offers disengaged youth the opportunity to participate in education and training with support, so that when they transition from the program they are ready to gain employment and become a contributing member of the community. Carol Dweck's research and theory of growth and fixed mindsets is particularly important when approaching the intervention strategies that we use with disengaged and 'at-risk' students. Staff at BYLC take an approach to teaching were students are provided with positive affirmations and feedback based on their willingness to try new things, take risks, and grow.

Recently, students considered the idea of having "grit" as part of our focus on growth mindset. Grit is the strength of character to persevere even when things get tough. Upon reflection, many of our students realised that they do indeed have grit, when the focus is something they are truly passionate about. ENVIRONMENT IS IN THE BAG

With Australian consumers currently using 3.92 billion plastic bags each year, Shalom College's very own YCS club recognised the need for action against the impact of waste and plastic on our environment. The Young Christian Students is an international movement, present in over 80 countries, that empowers secondary school students to take action based on issues within their community. The plastic bag ban, recently introduced state-wide on the 1st of July, served as motivation for the group to take action against plastic bag use. With the aim of combatting our dependence on single-use plastic bags, a reusable bag initiative began. In collaboration with an Australian promotions company, along with the support of the Shalom P&F,500 personalised bags were ordered, to be sold within

the school and wider community. In the hopes of encouraging student involvement, a design competition was run, inviting students to submit their best hand-drawn or digital entries. Each entry had to match the criteria: containing an image that encapsulated the vision and values of the group. As well as winning a cash prize, Year 12 student Ella Boas will have her design printed on every bag sold. With the environment being such a pressing topic in today's society, Boas expressed her passion and love for nature. "I'm also really passionate about the environment so it was a cause that I wanted to support in any way I could, single use plastic is a serious issue in our community." As a talented local artist, Boas' hand-drawn entry perfectly epitomised the values and motivations behind the YCS

With the world around us suffering at the hands of humanity's careless use of plastic, Boas urged the community to take a stand and support the use of reusable products in day-to-day life.

"Plastic, especially single use plastic bags, are a massive contributing factor to the degradation of the state of the environment. They have been normalised in our society to the point where they are used and wasted to the extent stated in my design, and that is not ok." Projects such as this one highlight just how passionate young people in the Bundaberg region are about making a positive impact on the world around them. It reminds us of our responsibility to protect and fight for our planet. After all, it's the only one we've got, and isn't she beautiful!

DIVERSITY NO BARRIER TO LEARNING AT SHALOM

Picture this – you have just moved away from all you have ever known and are placed in a school with not a single person you recognise. But that's not the scariest part. You are in a foreign country and everyone speaks a different language. For some students, that is the reality of going to school each day. To assist in this situation, Shalom offers the English as a Second Language program for

students born in a foreign country with varying levels of English proficiency. Mrs Parton, the coordinator and teacher of the program helps ESL students in numerous areas, including English, social skills and everyday life necessities, which require literacy and comprehension skills. Depending on the students' needs and their enrolment level, Mrs Parton says they 'do some functional grammar then we move onto genre based and structure of English.' which can include how to structure language in subject areas with unfamiliar styles such as science reports, essays or oral presentations. Rose Jose, who

participates in the ESL program at Shalom, was born in Kerala, Southern India and has been at the school since she was in Year 8. Now in Year 11 she believes she has benefitted immensely from the regular sessions with Mrs Parton and is looking to study in the medical field when she finishes school. Shalom's ESL program helps students achieve in school and into university, but also helps with their immersion as literate citizens of Australia. Mrs Parton says: "I think that one in four Australians statistically, has parents born elsewhere if not themselves born overseas. Nearly 20 % of Australians speak a language other than English in their homes. So we're a really multicultural nation that's only going to increase". As she says, "ESL students, such as Rose bring a rich cultural diversity to the community of Shalom and our college life."

SUPPORTING YOUTH

Some people may believe that school is just about doing homework, finishing assignments and passing exams. However, students face a range of other challenges in their day, which can inhibit them from completing these tasks, such as: family issues, to 'interpersonal problems', anxiety and depression. Recognising this, Shalom has developed an amazing team of qualified staff who are on hand to assist their students. Shalom College offers two fulltime counsellors on site daily,

qualified social worker Mrs Karen Miller-Smith and qualified psychologist Mr Gavin Hill, as well as part time counsellor, Mrs Chaplin. Together they see students, at their discretion, assisting them in any issues they may be facing, which said by Mr Hill: 'might go unchecked due to various reasons such as access to professional assistants, like psychologists, or financial restrictions.' These issues were noted as 'diverse' and differing in respect to year level, told Mrs Miller-Smith, whilst Mr Hill reported to have seen an increase in anxiety related issues. Collectively,

the counsellors agree that they believe they can give more immediate support in this environment rather than a clinical one. Appointments can be scheduled before, during and after school. Additionally, 'if someone needs to see someone every day, they're seen every day', even if only for ten minutes, noted Mrs Miller-Smith. This can make a huge difference in students' day-today mental wellbeing. Wholly, the accessibility provided by Shalom College's counselling services to students and families make it, as said by Mr Hill, 'an invaluable service to improve student's wellbeing and health."







PRINCIPALS MESSAGE

Term 2 at Gin Gin State High School has been very busy and successful with students and staff participating in many school and community activities.

The term started with our annual ANZAC ceremony which was held at school. This was attended by many community representatives and RSL members. The town ceremony was also well attended with almost 100 of our students participating in the key community event.

The annual school musical was another huge community event with more than 350 people attending the musical which was held over 2 nights. This year's musical was titled "Sheerluck Holmes" and was a witty story of murder, mystery and love. This production involves many of our students and staff and is very much appreciated by the school community.

Our school is also heavily involved in supporting our Chaplaincy committee in raising money for these vital support personnel. This year our students assisted with catering and serving for the Chaplaincy Dinner which raised in access of \$50 000. The school is very proud of the students who gave of their time to assist in making the evening such a success.

Over the last 12 months students from our Special Needs Department have been involved in a program using Alpacas to engage students to communicate and follow a training program for the animals. The program has had a great deal of success in lowering student anxiety and increasing communication and has been recognised through an ABC news item which was televised during the term. As a result of this publicity, staff are being invited to speak on radio programs across Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria. Our key teacher has also been invited to speak at the national conference of the Special Education Principal Leaders Association in Sydney.

There have been many other highlights from Term 2 such as the Ski Trip, Incentive Day, Road Craft. Athletics Carnival and our contribution to the Gin Gin Show. I am very proud of the contributions our school has made to the community and to the learning experiences of our students.

A lot of how headspace is delivered in the community is influenced by our Youth Engagement Committee (YEC), after all, they are the experts at being young and knowing what is important to them in their peers. Our current YEC Chair is Kay, she is a passionate volunteer, who also brings a true community spirit and dedication to changing the narrative of mental health.

Tell us a little about you first?

Hey, I'm Kay, I have lived in Bundy for about 12 years, I went to school at Kepnock, I work shifts, and spend lots of my time volunteering. I'm a mad comics and Harley Quinn fan, but mostly I love my time at headspace.

How did you get involved with headspace?

I knew a few young people who were already involved with the YEC, and they invited me to come Let's Talk About
Mental Health with
Kay!

along, and I'm terrible at saying no. I attended my first meeting around May last year, in February I was appointed Chair. We have a great team of volunteers and staff that make all our time at **headspace** fun.

What do you like most about volunteering with headspace?

For me it's about supporting other young people with their mental health. It's OK to not always be OK, we need to encourage others to talk and listen. **headspace** allows us to spread a positive message and continue conversations around early help seeking.

What are some key tips for young people around looking after their mental health?

To know they are not alone, many others struggle too. Talking to someone really is a great relief and if you don't have friends or family to talk to, headspace can really help. Self-care can be easy, we just need to take little steps like eating well, getting a good amount of sleep and positive thinking. Not every day is glitter and rainbows though and that's OK too.

How do we get more young people to seek early support?

I think it's about conversations, if we continue to talk about mental health there won't be so much shame. It's about breaking the taboo and stigma associated with mental health. If we learn to listen, have genuine discussions and encourage them to talk then we are taking really positive steps in supporting them. Some people seem scared to talk about mental health.

commenced with APM as a direct registration job seeker on 27th April 2018 after completing ESAt with Centrelink. Georgina has been diagnosed and treating autism ASD and ODD (oppositional

defence disorder) anxiety, depression, Asperger syndrome, OCD all being treated with medication and specialist intervention. Once Georgina completed initial appointment Nicole Allison Bundaberg direct registration consultant created resume and began working with Georgina and marketing for potential positions. Direct registration consultant Nicole did take Georgia out to see 7 local employers reverse marketing as Georgina was looking for employment in hospitality, childcare or retail. Direct registration consultant Nicole approached EC Shane Olive if he had any employers that Georgina could be marketed to as direct registration consultant Nicole expressed that Georgina really wanted to work but was lacking in confidence and anxiety levels with interviews.

EC Shane Olive contacted a local retail employer he regularly deals with Tracy Harrington from Cool Stuff 4 Kids as EC Shane Olive thought this employer and the retail business would be a safe environment for Georgina to be employed in. EC Shane Olive began negotiating over several days visiting and phoning the employer up to 6 times a day taking gifts of coffee and chocolates attempting to secure employment for Georgina. Originally Tracy advised she could not create the position for the WBM hours required for Georgina and there could be no position and was very sorry.

EC Shane Olive continued to negotiate and market Georgina for a retail position and worked closely with his regional manager Ulanda Cannon to have approval for wage subsidy and then paid work trial for Georgina to be secured into employment. Georgina commenced employment on 30th May 2018 working 15hrs per week and is loving her job and has thanked EC Shane Olive for getting her dream job in retail.

This was great team work from the Bundaberg office Direct Registration Consultant Nicole direct registering and preparing Georgina, EC Shane Olive marketing and negotiating with employer contact and regional manager Ulanda Canon approving increased wage subsidy and work trial payments urgently. During the July School Holidays Councils **Youth Action Team** volunteered their time to host the Get Ahead Building Your Future Lifeskills workshops. The team identified 13 lifeskill topics that young people had shown interest in knowing more about. Workshops covered resumes, cover letters, how to dress for an interview, tax, budgeting, renting, health food options, looking after yourself, mock interviews, apprenticeships and traineeships, insurance and workers rights. The team worked with a range of local buinesses and services to develop a program that was specifically for young people. Over the 13 workshops we had 103 young people attend with many attendees gaining valuable information – even on boring subjects. The team will now look at what worked well and what didnt and think about hosting more workshops like this in the future.
